FINANCES

Over the past five years, BCA has seen a substantial rise in income and in expenditures. The graph below indicates the dynamic change!

The orange line indicates how BCA's operating income has risen from \$42,944 in 2015 to \$346,355 in 2019, an increase of over 800%!

The blue line shows how donations have increased over the same time period, from \$23,422 in 2015 to \$76,893 in 2019, an increase of over 300%.

In 2015, donations represented 55% of BCA's operating income; in 2019, donations represent only about 22% of BCA's operating income.

VISIONING OUR FUTURE...

US & MEXICO TOURS

BCA's tours to Mexico are an essential strategy in providing raising cross border awareness. They also serve as an income source for other BCA initiatives.

At the annual meeting of the US-Mexico Commission in Scottsdale, delegates were blown away when they heard that BCA led forty-five (45) tours to Sonora during the 2018/2019 season.

 Mayors and representatives from other border cities are interested in replicating BCA's collaborative model, including cross border tours.

VISIONING OUR FUTURE...

DEVELOPING OUR ORGANIZATION

INSIGHT #1.

BCA is no longer a small start-up nonprofit, working out of a garage! BCA has grown from:

- A circle of volunteers with no office and no staff (2015-2017)
- One tour option (Nogales CBT) to ten tour options plus Spain
- A budget of \$43 K (2015) to a budget of \$347 K (2019)
- A very simple financial organization to a much more complex one with federal grants

GOAL:

Develop and fill a position for Director of Operations as part of the new leadership team.

INSIGHT #2:

In order for BCA's growth to continue, additional program resources are needed. A new program staff person will:

- Assist in developing tour options on both sides of the US-Mexico border
- Lead BCA in developing programming for K-12 as well as college and university students, including our summer program

- Research and develop (R & D) current and future strategies for "bridging the border and fostering community"
- Procure additional grant funding for targeted initiatives

GOAL:

Develop and fill a position for a Specialist in Education and Research.

INSIGHT #3:

BCA's tour options are restricted because of a lack of transportation options. A van will:

- Provide transportation for summer intern program
- —— Enable the development of tour options, particularly on the US side
 - Relieve stress on limited border parking options

GOAL

Secure a 15 - 22 passenger van for BCA use

A NEW ORGANIZATION

BCA BOARD OF DIRECTORS: 10-15 persons

EXECUTIVE COMMITTEE: President, Vice-President, Secretary and Treasurer

of BCA Board of Directors; Senior Advisor

LEADERSHIP TEAM: Director of Programs & Director of Operations

EDUCATION & RESEARCH SPECIALIST: Works with Director of Programs

STAFF RESPONSIBILITIES

Director of Programs: Oversees program development (tours and classes) and special projects such as NPS grant; acts as spokesperson for BCA; community liaison; public relations; marketing; develops grant narratives.

Director of Operations: Oversees internal operation of BCA, including office administration, financial matters, resource management, contracts and business matters; procurement officer; develops grant budgets and files financial reports.

Senior Advisor: Serves as liaison between BCA Board and Leadership team; relates to special projects, populations and donors.

Education and Research Specialist: Develops education programming for K-12 as well as college & university students; engages in research for grant procurement; assists with tour leadership and forum offerings. Title and salary dependent on education and experience.
